


Aristides Baltas is Professor of Philosophy and Philosophy of Science at the National Technical University of Athens. His work has sought to bridge analytic and continental approaches to philosophy and traverses the areas of physics, mathematics, psychoanalysis, and historical materialism. He received the prestigious State Award for Nonfiction in 2002 for his book, Aspects and Objects of Self, and the Prize for Excellence in Academic Teaching, awarded by the President of the Hellenic Republic. His books include On the Epistemology of Louis Althusser (1994), Hosting Jacques Derrida: In the Margins of Science and Politics (1996), Newton's Unconscious and Freud's Apple (2004), and Peeling Potatoes or Grinding Lenses: Spinoza and Young Wittgenstein Converse on Immanence and Its Logic (2012).
