The Geopolitical Plan of Alexandros Mavrokordatos and the Greek Independence (1820-1832)

On Sunday, March 13, 2022, at 2:00 pm US Central Time (9:00 pm Athens time), Hellenic Link–Midwest presents *Prof. Aristides Hatzis*, University of Athens, Greece, on the occasion of the Celebration of the 1821 Greek Revolution, in an online lecture titled: *"The Geopolitical Plan of Alexandros Mavrokordatos and the Greek Independence (1820–1832)."* This is a lecture supported by the <u>Hellenic Foundation, Chicago</u>.

Mavrokordatos was the only one who understood from the very beginning that this Revolution was going to be successful only if the Greeks would attempt and achieve a major geopolitical reorientation. The Greeks should escape from Russia's sphere of influence; they should abolish Russia's monopoly in their "protection"; they should correct a false impression in the West that discredited their revolution: The Greek uprising was not part of a Russian plan to break the Ottoman Empire apart; Greeks were not Russia's pawns. The political goal of the Greek Revolution was not the founding of another autonomous principality, subjugated to the Sultan but under the heavy shadow of Russia. It was much more: the founding of an independent state, governed as a European state, a part of the West. In this lecture professor Hatzis will discuss the development of Mavrokordatos' geopolitical plan from 1820 to 1826 and its political effect on the Greek issues from 1827 to 1832.

Aristides Hatzis is a Professor of Philosophy of Law and Theory of Institutions at the University of Athens (Ph.D. University of Chicago), the Director of Research at the Center for Liberal Studies-Athens and a Fellow of the Institute for Research in Economics and Fiscal Issues-Paris. He is a member of the National Committee for the Celebration for the Bicentennial of the Greek Revolution (1821–2021). His book *The Noblest Cause: The 1821 Greek War of Independence* will be published in the United States in 2022. His op-eds have been published by the New York Times, the Financial Times, the Wall Street Journal, the Washington Post, the CNBC and he has given interviews to major international media outlets

DETAILED INSTRUCTIONS FOR JOINING HLM'S ONLINE LECTURE ON MARCH 13, 2022 AT 2:00 PM ON EITHER ZOOM OR FACEBOOK.

1) If you already have the Zoom application ("Zoom Client") installed on your machine, then you go through the following steps:

A. Click on the webinar link https://us02web.zoom.us/j/84581365177

A small "Launch Application" screen will appear. The screen will show the following: "Choose Other Application" and "Open Link" and "Cancel"

B. Click "Open Link"

A new screen will appear asking for your **email and name**.

If the system asks you to also provide the Webinar ID, enter the following: 845 8136 5177.

C. Once you enter the required information, click "Join Webinar"

Once you have joined the webinar, familiarize yourself with the set of buttons above or below the screen. One in particular, the "Q&A" button allows you to type questions for the speaker during or after the presentation.

2) If you don't have the Zoom application installed, clicking the above link will take you through an installation process first but since that is rather complicated, we recommend that you install Zoom first on your PC, laptop or tablet.

To **install Zoom** go to the following link:

Opening that link points to a download file (see down arrow pointing to the .exe file at the bottom of your screen) that you will have to accept (click on the "Keep" button) and then open (click on the file name) in order to download the Zoom client IF YOU ARE WORKING ON A PC OR LAPTOP.

IF YOU ARE WORKING ON A TABLET, the same page provides a link to **Apple Store** (button named "Download in App Store") for installation on iPad or to **Google Play** (for tablets other than iPad: in that case click on the "Download in Google Play" button)

Once you succeed installing Zoom (we recommend doing that before the event) then you can proceed with steps A, B, and C in the previous paragraph (1), right before the webinar, in order to attend.

3) If Zoom installation fails, either because you are running an old machine with an operating system that does not support Zoom (e.g. Windows Vista or any Windows OS earlier than Windows 7) or an earlier version of your browser, then you can instead attend the lecture that will also be **broadcast live on** Facebook.
